

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George Kunihiro Elevated to the College of Fellows (FAIA)

AIA Japan is pleased to announce that our member George Kunihiro has been elevated to the American Institute of Architects College of Fellows

The AIA elevated 112 architects to its prestigious College of Fellows, an honor given to members who have made contributions of national significance to the profession. Out of a membership of more than 86,000, there are fewer than 2,600 AIA members distinguished with the honor of fellowship.

George Kunihiro received the A.B. from University of California, Berkeley and the M.Arch from the Harvard University Graduate School of Design. He is a professor of Architecture at the Kokushikan University and a principal at George Kunihiro Architect and Associates in Tokyo since 1997. George joined the AIA Los Angeles Chapter in 1981 and currently serves on the Board of the AIA Japan Chapter.

2008 AIA Japan Design Award




Student Honor Award: Green Core Project by Atsushi Abe, Nozomu Onodera, Hiroaki Koike from Tohoku University.

Afterthought of the AIA Award Event. by Martin van der Linden, Assoc, AIA

To be an architect is a lonely job. Don't get me wrong, I don't assume that all architects work alone, in Japan or anywhere else a significant number of architects are employed by the larger companies and work together. No, what I mean with "lonely" is the architect who pursues what I would like to call "the cause of architecture", are alone, as they have decided in setting their own direction of *their* cause of architecture.

Let me explain of what I want to say with this. A business study in the Harvard Review showed that for people to become successful, they first of all need to set a direction for themselves. The study found out that most people who actually became successful had a clear goal set early in their career. Arata Isozaki stresses the same goal-setting principle as he described what I called the cause of architecture above: that an architect should spend his twenties searching for the direction within architecture to pursue, refine this direction in their thirties, while in his/her forties an architect should materialize these ideas. Whether Isozaki implies that it takes almost 20 years to become an architect is not the point that I want to make here, although it does seem to be rather ironical. Isozaki is echoing Alberti's definition of an architect as a highly talented individual who uses knowledge, reason and above all his or her genius to create masterworks. I believe that this striving for artistic and (or) personal greatness that reinforces individuality and becomes the source of architectural loneliness.

This creates a dilemma that, according to Bertrand Russell, is why people with artistic jobs are on average less happy then men of science. As Russell wrote: "When the public can not understand a picture or a poem, they conclude that it is a bad picture or a bad poem. When they cannot understand the theory of relativity they conclude (rightly) that their education has been insufficient."

Does this mean that architects are doomed to unhappiness? QED? Maybe, but let us not stop here. If we accept the idiom that as architects we will always need to face the fact of, in the words of Russell of "being despised and being despicable" (and let's not even start talking about "high brow architecture" which hides under the cloak of pseudo-philosophy) or being adorned, then yes, to be an architect is a very lonely job indeed... But wait, it gets worse! Architects seem to get even little comfort from the fruit of their labor: the very buildings they design. As the now 91 year old I.M Pei confesses in Hanno Rauterberg's book, Talking Architecture: "I'm really happy with only a handful [of my buildings]". So what comfort is there then for architects? (Apart from marrying another architect, think of Charles and Ray Eames, Alison and Peter Smithson, Diller and Scofidio, Tod Williams and Billie Tsien...)

When in 1857 a group of architects founded the American Institute of Architects, their mission was, apart from the promotion and elevation of the standing of the profession, "...to combine the efforts of those engaged in the practice of Architecture, for the general advancement of the Art". To me this notion of being able to share an experience, a shoulder to cry on, a hand to pick us up is the comfort that architects will need more than anything else. Or in the 2300 year old words of Epicurus: "Of all the things that wisdom provides to help one live one's entire life in happiness, the greatest by far is the possession of friendship." I believe that associations such as the AIA Japan are crucial to us architects, not from a networking point of view, but as a way to stay sane. I let Epicurus have the final say: "Before you eat or drink anything, consider carefully who you eat or drink with, rather than what you eat or drink: for feeding without a friend is the life of a lion or a wolf."

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
